## Review of Recent Brownfields Grant-Funded Spending in New York City

## October 20, 2006

The following outlines funding and spending for New York City brownfields projects. Although the request was specifically for the amount of city spending in 2005, our review covers projects funded in whole or in part with federal and state grants awarded since 1996. Since brownfields projects typically span multiple years and often several phases, from assessment to actual remediation, a multiyear presentation gives a more complete picture of the status of current brownfields-related work.

To our knowledge, most city spending has been to meet matching requirements of federal and state grants. New York City receives a variety of federal and state grants to reimburse the city's cost on brownfields projects. If a project is not fully funded by the grant, the city is responsible for matching the non-reimbursed portions from either public or private sources. If project costs exceed the grant limit, the city may become responsible for the excess expenses—effectively reducing the reimbursement rate.

The NY State Environmental Restoration Program (ERP) grants reimburse up to 90 percent of on-site costs of investigation and cleanup of a brownfields site. Since the award in 1998, the city has received \$27.3 million from the state under this program and the city has provided \$3.1 million in matching funds. Total spending to date (as of August 2006) from all sources is \$5.4 million.

The NY State Response Grant for the Bronxcheseter Urban Renewal Area is a state grant from federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) funds to cover environmental assessment and investigation costs. The \$145,000 grant was matched with \$40,000 of city funds. The City will provide additional environmental investigation and a supplemental report to the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation, at a projected cost of \$35,000.

Grants from the federal *Environmental Protection Agency* generally reimburse 100 percent of city spending. Exceptions include the NY Metro Brownfields project, a regional initiative for which the city's Department of Environmental Protection is providing \$150,000. The Mariners Marsh and High Line cleanup projects are expected to receive \$40,000 each in city contributions, with the former receiving its city match in inkind services. Since 1996, the EPA has awarded the city over \$2.6 million with the city providing approximately \$230,000 in additional funds. Total spending to date is \$417,000.

Table 1 presents project detail by grant program, including the initial award year, estimated total project cost (where available), award amount, city contribution, and spending as of August 2006. The table also shows which city agency received the grant and whether it was spent in the agency's expense or capital budget.

Table 2 presents brownfields grants awarded to community-based organizations under the Brownfield Opportunity Area program, created by the New York State Brownfield Law in 2003. These grants fund up to 90 percent of costs for eligible planning studies, implementation strategy development and assessment activities in areas that have multiple brownfields. The grants do not pay for actual remediation. The "sponsoring" organizations are the groups receiving and administering the grant. Recipients are either community-based organizations (CBOs) or partnerships between one or more CBOs and the city.

A total of \$1.85 million has been awarded to New York City-based recipients. No spending or commitments have been made yet on these grants.
